Welcome. The Public Safety area of the University of Alabama works to help you maintain your personal safety and to protect your property by providing police, environmental safety services, security, access control and emergency preparedness. By sharing information, we hope you can reduce your chances of becoming a crime or accident victim. We believe that an informed community is a safer community.

Each year, The University of Alabama publishes the Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report which includes crime statistics and outlines UA security policies and procedures. Please take the time to familiarize yourself with this report so you can become an informed member of our community and contribute to the University's efforts to create and maintain a safe environment in which we all can live, study, work and play. Remember: Always use good safety sense and don't hesitate to **contact** The University of Alabama Police Department (UAPD) whenever you need assistance or more information about the services they provide.

A Report of the Three Most Recent Years' Crime Statistics

In accordance with the federal regulations of the Campus Security Act, the University of Alabama publishes *both* crime statistics for the three most recent calendar years *and* UA security-related policies and procedures. This information is distributed each year to enrolled students and current employees and is also made available to prospective employees and students. The University Police Department's **Safer Living Guide** informs our prospective and current students, faculty, and staff to the general procedures for reporting crimes both on and off campus and includes tips on preventing theft of property and crimes of violence, including physical and sexual assaults.

In compliance with 1998 amendments to the Campus Security Act (now known as the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act) and Department of Education regulations, the crime statistics published in this report illustrate: 1) the reporting of crime categories as specified below, 2) the reporting of specified hate crimes by category of prejudice against the victim (race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, disability) and, 3) the reporting of violation arrests and referrals for campus disciplinary action as specified below. Each of these statistical categories are further broken down by geographic area: **On-Campus** (includes **On-Campus Residential** facilities), **Non-Campus** property; and **Public Property** (includes property within campus or immediately adjacent to it). See **Crime Statistics** for more information.

The University Police Department makes annual requests to the Tuscaloosa City Police Department for crime statistics taken from the **public areas** within campus or immediately adjacent to campus to be included in the Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report.

The Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report includes crime statistics for the following *categories of crimes*, as reported to the UA Police Department, other UA campus security authorities, and local law enforcement: homicide (murder, non-negligent and negligent manslaughter); sex offenses (forcible, non-forcible); robbery; aggravated assault; burglary; motor vehicle theft; and arson, including hate crimes associated with these offenses and hate crimes associated with larceny/theft, simple assault, intimidation, or destruction/damage/vandalism of property. Also included are statistics for the following categories of **violation arrests** and **referrals for campus disciplinary action**: liquor law violations, drug law violations, and illegal weapons possession violations.

A Guide to University of Alabama Security Procedures and Policies

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Reporting On-Campus Crimes and Other Emergencies

To maximize safety on campus, the University Police Department strongly encourages anyone with knowledge about any crime, suspicious activity, or unsafe actions or conditions on campus (either as a witness or as a victim) to make an immediate report to the University Police in person or by telephone. Reporting does not mean you must take legal action, however it may help law enforcement stop further incidents as well as help them keep the community informed about criminal activity.

To make a report in person, go to the University Police Department. To make a report by phone, call 205-348-5454 and describe the situation to the communications operator. In emergency situations, including fires and medical emergencies, call 911 or UAPD at 205-348-5454. All 911 calls made from **campus phones** go directly to the UA Police Department; all **cell phone** 911 calls are routed to UAPD through a local 911 center.

UA students requiring non-emergency medical care may contact the [Student Health Center](#) at 205-348-6262. Students seeking counseling services may contact the [Counseling Center](#) at 205-348-3863, the [Psychology Clinic](#) at 348-5000, or the [Women's Resource Center](#) at 205-348-5040.

UA employees requiring non-emergency medical care may contact the University Medical Center at 205-348-1770 or any of the DCH Health System facilities, e.g., DCH Regional Medical Center at 205-759-7111 and the Northport Medical Center at 205-345-3500, for non-emergency medical care and for counseling. UA employees who are victims of interpersonal relationship violence may also contact the Women's Resource Center for counseling and advocacy.

UA Police Response to a Crime Report

When you report a crime to the UA Police Department, a UA police officer will meet with you, listen to what happened, and, if appropriate, make a preliminary report. Next, investigators will review the report and conduct a follow-up investigation. If a suspect is found and you decide to press charges, information will be presented to a warrant magistrate, who decides if there is probable cause to arrest the suspect. If there is, you will be asked to sign the arrest warrant, which UA Police officers will serve. A court date will be set; you may have to be present to testify.

If you are uncomfortable making a criminal report to UA Police but would like to help ensure the most accurate accounting of all criminal incidents on or around campus, we encourage you to report the criminal incident to one of the University of Alabama campus security authorities listed in the first two paragraphs of the section [Additional Sources of Statistical Information](#).

If You Don't Want to Make a Police Report and/or Take Legal Action

The University of Alabama Police Department encourages you to report criminal activity even if you don't want to take legal action in order to help us maintain accurate statistical records. The University of Alabama Police Department is responsible for preparing the University's Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report and for compiling the crime statistics included in the report. We would like to keep the community as informed as possible. The information you report may require the UAPD to issue a [Crime Alert/UAPD Advisory](#) if they determine that the circumstances warrant such action. See information below regarding another way in which to make a voluntary, confidential reporting of forcible and non-forcible sexual offenses.

Reporting Off-Campus Crimes and Other Emergencies

Victims or witnesses to criminal activity occurring off campus should contact the agency that has jurisdiction:

University Police officers can assist in notifying other law enforcement agencies.

Student Organization Facilities: The University of Alabama operates no off-campus student organization facilities. All student organizations recognized by The University of Alabama are located on campus and are therefore served by the UA Police Department. If you believe a crime has been committed within an on-campus student organization building, report the incident to the UA Police at 205-348-5454.

Off-Campus Housing: The only off-campus housing managed as part of UA's on-campus community is the Bluff at Waterworks Landing, a privately-owned apartment community located on Jack Warner Parkway East. The UA Police routinely patrol these apartments and respond to calls for the purpose of reporting statistics and for prevention efforts through the **Community Oriented Policing** (COP) program. If you believe a crime has occurred at the Bluff apartments, contact the UA Police at 205-348-5454.

Fringe Areas of Campus: While the City of Tuscaloosa Police have primary jurisdiction and responsibility in all areas off-campus, UA Police can and do respond to most incidents that occur in close proximity to campus. UA Police have a Fringe Patrol Division dedicated to providing additional law enforcement presence around the perimeter of campus. UA Police regularly meet with and communicate with local law enforcement regarding the occurrence of crimes in the fringe areas and UA Police assist in crime prevention programming and techniques through the **SGA's Crimson Watch initiative**. If you believe a crime has occurred in close proximity to campus, please report the crime to the City of Tuscaloosa Police Department at 205-349-2121.

Daily Crime Logs/Summary of Criminal Incidents

The University of Alabama Police compiles statistical information from the contents of the UAPD Daily Crime Log, which contains summaries of each day's crime reports made to the UA Police Department. The crime log summaries include each incident's location, type, date, time, and disposition of the complaint. UAPD crime logs are available for public viewing, 24 hours a day, in the lobby of the Police Department.

Crime Alerts/UAPD Advisories

If a serious or unique crime has occurred and the circumstances warrant it (as in the case of a violent crime against a person or a major property crime), a special, **timely crime alert** (entitled UAPD Advisory) is prepared and distributed. UAPD Advisories are designed to give students and employees a timely notification of crimes and to heighten their safety awareness. Sometimes, a UAPD Advisory provides information that leads to an arrest and conviction of the perpetrator. The University Police will issue a UAPD Advisory when a crime that represents an **imminent, ongoing threat to campus community** is reported to any of the local law enforcement agencies or other crime reporting sources. In such situations, every attempt will be made to distribute a UAPD Advisory within **12 hours** of the

time the incident is reported; however, release of the UAPD Advisory is subject to the availability of facts concerning the incident. The University Police Department's cooperative working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies facilitates communication about crime reported to outside law enforcement agencies that, likewise, may warrant timely issuance of an Advisory. UAPD Advisories are prominently posted at on-campus locations frequented by students and employees and/or are placed on the University Police Web site at <http://www.police.ua.edu/advisory.html>.

Missing Residential Student Policy and Procedure

At The University of Alabama, we are committed to the safety of our students. This policy contains the official notification procedures for The University of Alabama concerning missing students who reside in on-campus housing, in accordance with the requirements of the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008 (HEOA). The purpose of this policy is to promote the safety and welfare of members of the University community through compliance with HEOA requirements. This policy should be adhered to by all University faculty, staff, and students.

Policy

This policy, with accompanying procedures, is designed to guide a collaborative response if a residential student is determined to be missing for 24 hours. The term "residential student" refers to any student living in a residence hall, Greek House, campus-owned apartment, or campus-leased apartment. Through Fall semester 2011, each residential student had the opportunity annually, either through Housing and Residential Communities' housing application process or, with respect to Greek housing, the Office of Greek Affairs, to identify an individual to be notified within 24 hours of the University of Alabama Police Department's determination that the student is missing. Beginning with the Spring semester of 2012, residential students will have to complete the Missing Student Contact Information Form in myBama or check an opt-out box prior to registering for classes each term. As a student goes to register for classes, s/he will update the address form, the emergency contact form, and now the missing student contact form. This confidential contact information will be available only to authorized campus officials and may not be disclosed except to UAPD in furtherance of a missing person investigation.

Procedures

Students, employees, or other individuals should report that a residential student is potentially missing to Housing and Residential Communities (HRC) at 205-348-6676 and/or to UAPD at 205-348-5454. Reports received by HRC will be immediately referred to UAPD. Thereafter, HRC and UAPD will begin a concurrent review of the situation. If the residential student is determined to be missing by UAPD, then within the next 24 hours UAPD will notify the individual identified by the student as the missing person contact.

In addition, if the student is under 18 years old and is not emancipated, the student's custodial parent or guardian will also be notified.

Emergency Response, Notification and Evacuation Procedures

Purpose

One of the highest priorities at The University of Alabama is the safety and well-being of students, faculty, staff, and visitors that make up our University community. Should a significant emergency or dangerous situation be reported that could present an immediate threat to the health or safety to anyone on University owned or leased property, it is the policy of The University of Alabama to have the appropriate university officials immediately respond, evaluate, and confront the threat. Upon confirmation that a threat exists, the University will provide an emergency notification to the University community and will update campus community of any ongoing incident.

Overview

The University of Alabama's Emergency Operation Plan directs the University Police to respond and manage campus emergencies with oversight by the Emergency Preparedness Response Policy Group (EPRPG). The EPRPG is made up of key University officials representing senior leadership positions.

The Office of University Relations (UR) is responsible for emergency notification and crisis communication; for redundancy, UAPD and the Office of Emergency Preparedness will serve as a backup to UR.

Emergency Notification

An emergency notification is an urgent communication regarding a significant emergency or dangerous situation that may compromise the health and safety of members of the campus community. Typically an emergency notification is provided without delay upon confirmation of a threat and empowers the recipient to take appropriate action to minimize injury or loss of life.

In the event of a campus emergency, UAPD along with other appropriate response agencies (e.g. fire department, gas company, etc.) will immediately respond and investigate the threat. If a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health and safety of students or employees is confirmed, UAPD will notify the Office of University Relations (24/7), who will directly trigger an emergency notification to the campus community using some or all of the following systems depending on the circumstance: (1) UA Alerts (email, phone calls, and text messages using an external system); (2) Campus PA system (internal and/or external); (3) Internal campus e-mail system; (4) UA Home Page; and (5) Print/Broadcast Media, and (6) Digital Signage.

An exception to this policy may occur in those instances where the notification will, in the professional judgment of the EPRPG, UAPD, or Incident Commander, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency. Once the incident has concluded, University Relations will use the same systems to broadcast an “All Clear” notification or information regarding the resolution of the emergency.

In special circumstances, UAPD or the Office of Emergency Preparedness may trigger an emergency notification to the campus community via UA Alerts or the Campus PA System. In the event an alert is triggered, UAPD will notify the Office of University Relations; UR will then assume responsibility for further communications.

Emergency Response and Notification Process

- 1. UAPD and other appropriate agencies respond to a reported emergency, evaluate the situation, and confirm there is a campus threat**
- 2. UAPD and other appropriate response agencies assess whether the threat is area-specific or campus-wide**
- 3. UAPD notifies UR**
- 4. UR drafts or selects pre-scripted message**
- 5. UR activates emergency notification systems**
- 6. UAPD coordinates with UR and provides updated information when available**
- 7. UR posts updates or communicates “All Clear” as appropriate**

Crisis Communication

Crisis communication is the continued or ongoing update of information regarding a significant emergency or dangerous situation.

After the initial emergency notification, continued or updated crisis communications will take place on the University’s website, www.ua.edu, social media, and through the local media (radio, television).

Students, faculty, and staff are directed to monitor the website and local media for updated crisis information. This will also enable the larger community to receive emergency information.

Determining Appropriate Segment of Community

In many instances, an emergency notification will include the entire campus population (students, faculty, and staff). However, during holidays, weekends or other periods outside of normal business hours, or under circumstances where the nature of the emergency supports an area-specific notification, the notification may go to only those persons who are believed to be affected. In this situation, UA Alerts could be utilized to notify a particular

segment of the community (e.g. students only) and the Campus PA system could be utilized to notify occupants of a particular building or buildings where the system is deployed.

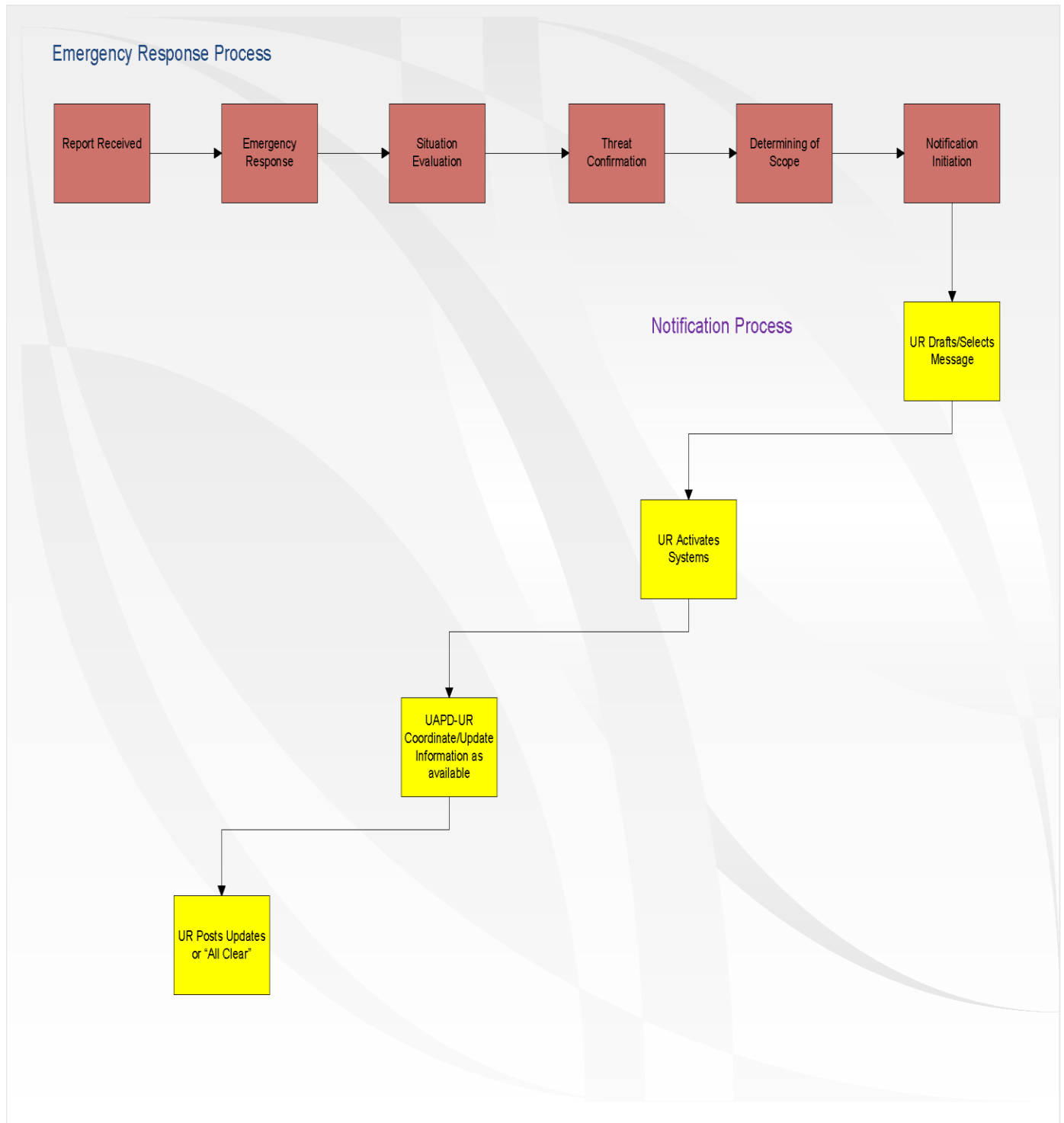
Content and Timing of Notification

University Relations is responsible for drafting and approving emergency messages and crisis communication; UR will determine, without delay, the content of the notification and initiate the notification system. To expedite the notification process, UR has drafted pre-scripted emergency messages for possible campus emergencies. These messages are posted within UA Alerts and the Campus PA system so that they can be immediately accessed and dispatched.

Should an unexpected emergency occur, UR will quickly draft and disseminate an appropriate emergency message.

In special circumstances, UAPD or the Office of Emergency Preparedness may draft and disseminate an appropriate emergency message.

Evacuation Procedures

In the event a building evacuation is required, the fire alarm, campus PA system, or emergency personnel will notify occupants to leave the building. A yearly fire drill with a required building evacuation is conducted by the Office of Environmental, Health, and Safety (EHS) for campus buildings. The drill is documented by EHS and includes the date, time, and description of the drill.

Should a campus evacuation be required, UAPD will notify the EPRPG under normal circumstances. Depending on the scope of the incident, the EPRPG will order a partial or full campus evacuation as necessary. In special circumstances, UAPD may order a building, area, or campus evacuation directly.

When an evacuation is ordered, affected students, faculty, and staff will be required to leave the evacuated area. In the event of a full campus evacuation, UAPD will work with UA Parking and Transportation to assist motorists leaving campus. If a prolonged evacuation is required, the Red Cross may be requested to shelter those students who are unable to return home and need assistance.

Testing

The Office of University Relations will test UA Alerts system annually by sending a test message to the entire campus community. The test will be documented and include the date, time, and notification results. In conjunction with this test, the Office of University Relations will publicize the web addresses of the Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report and the Office of Emergency Preparedness. Both web sites contain the University's emergency response, notification, and evacuation procedures. The Office of University Relations will also annually test the Campus PA system.

Publication

This policy will be published in the *Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report*.

Additional Sources of Statistical Information/Voluntary, Confidential Reporting

Consistent with Department of Education federal regulations, the UAPD has developed, and periodically reviews, procedures to include in campus crime statistics, reports of required crimes made to the following campus security authorities: the Office of the Vice President of Student Affairs, Office of Judicial Affairs, Intercollegiate Athletics (including Crimson Tide team coaches), the Office of the Dean of Students, student organization advisers, and the Office of Residential Life (including residential hall advisers).

Confidential Reporting to Pastoral and/or Professional Counselors

Under the law, campus pastoral and professional counselors, when acting as such, **are not** considered to be a campus security authority and **are not** required to report crimes for inclusion in the annual disclosure of campus crime statistics. As a matter of policy, however, The University of Alabama encourages its counselors at the Women's Resource Center, if and when they deem it appropriate, to inform the persons they are counseling of procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. All verified and unverified confidential reports of sexual offenses that meet the reporting criteria as determined by UAPD and that are made to the Women's Resource Center staff are included in UA campus crime statistics (see [Prevention and Reporting of Sexual Assaults](#) for more information about UA policies and procedures concerning sexual offenses). Crimes reported to counselors at the Counseling Center **are not** included unless the victim chooses to report to one of the other campus security authorities.

Submission of UA Crime Statistics to Federal Agencies

In October 2000, the University of Alabama Police began submitting crime statistics online to the Department of Education. Annually, we contribute crime statistics to the Uniform Crime Report published yearly by the Federal Bureau of Investigation by submitting data to the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center. This detailed statistical report is available each year at academic and public libraries.

Obtaining Information About Registered Sex Offenders

Adult criminal sex offenders who must register with law enforcement officials must notify those officials of their enrollment or employment at institutions of higher education within the state. That information should then be forwarded to campus police of the school or institution of higher education where the adult criminal sex offender is employed, carries on a vocation or is a student. In accordance with the Campus Sex Crimes Act of 2002, the University must notify the UA community of where this information can be obtained. Safety of and Access to Campus Facilities

The UA campus is made up of a variety of facilities, primarily student residences and academic/administrative buildings. Some student residence halls have entrance desks that are staffed by resident assistants during open hours. The entrance desks of Rose Towers, Tutwiler Hall, Paty Hall, Burke Hall, Harris Hall, Ridgecrest South Community and Bryant Hall are staffed 24 hours a day.

In the daytime, there is open access to academic and administrative buildings, with the exception of UA recreation facilities at which users must present membership cards. Academic and administrative facilities are locked before and after their business hours. Students and staff who have access to administrative/academic buildings for after-hours work must lock the exterior doors behind them after they enter, and they are encouraged to follow all personal safety precautions. If you have to study or work alone at night in a campus building, be sure a friend knows where you are and when you'll return home.

Security Considerations in the Maintenance of Campus Facilities

1. **Monitor Booths:** Monitor booths are located in the Tutwiler south and north parking areas, Ridgecrest South (north side and south side), Riverside East parking lot, and Rose Towers parking lot. These booths are staffed by **Security Resource** Assistants from 4:00 p.m. to 7:30 a.m., 7 days a week.
2. **Electronic Alarm Systems:** A computer-based electronic monitoring system located at the UA Police Department communications center monitors a comprehensive network of door-control, duress/intrusion-detection, and fire-alarm systems within campus facilities.
3. **Architectural Design:** The UA Police Division of Community Services provides input into the design of new and renovated campus facilities as it relates to physical and electronic security systems.
4. **Security/Health and Safety Surveys:** For University departments who request assistance, security surveys are conducted by Police Department sworn personnel. Health and safety surveys are conducted by **Environmental Health and Safety**.
5. **Grounds and Building Perimeter Surveys:** The University works to see that the indoor and outdoor lighting on campus contributes to safety. Each fall and spring semester, the Student Safety and Security Committee conducts a "lighting tour" to ensure that current equipment continues to meet the needs of the University community. Anyone who observes an outdoor light that is not working is encouraged to report the outage to University Facilities by calling 205-348-6001.

UAPD's Law Enforcement Authority and Arrest Powers

The University of Alabama Police Department provides full police and environmental safety services to the campus community. The University Police force consists of sworn officers with full arrest powers who are on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and are certified by the state of Alabama. These police officers are vested with all the powers, authority, and responsibilities of any police officer of the state on property owned or operated by the University, or in any circumstance in which an arrest by a police officer without a warrant is authorized by law.

In November 1998, UAPD became fully accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). The three-year accreditation was granted after an extensive review of the UA Police Department's policies, procedures, management, operations, and support services. CALEA's approval of UAPD for accreditation symbolizes a high degree of professionalism and a strong commitment to excellence within its program; standards that UAPD intends to maintain as it works to enhance campus safety now and in the future.

UAPD's Working Relationships with State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies

The University of Alabama Police Department, by statute, is responsible for the investigation of all alleged criminal offenses on the University of Alabama campus and on all property either owned or leased by the University of Alabama. Therefore, the department does not maintain any agreements or memoranda of understanding with other state and local law enforcement agencies specifically regarding the investigation of campus crime. However, The University of Alabama Police Department cooperates fully with local and state law enforcement agencies in cases that involve both on and off campus jurisdictions or when the resources of an agency other than the UAPD can be used to facilitate the resolution of an investigation. Local police agencies and University Police exchange information on a regular basis, routinely work together during UA sporting and other community events, and maintain a written mutual aid agreement where each agrees to provide assistance to other agencies upon request. University Police officers participate in the West Alabama Narcotics Task Force, which enforces all narcotics violations in Tuscaloosa County, and in the Tuscaloosa County Violent Crimes Task Force, which is responsible for investigating all serious crimes against persons in the county. These cooperative efforts enable the University Police to work with, and for, UA students and employees in situations that occur on and off campus.

Prompt and Accurate Reporting of Crimes

As noted in the sections [Reporting On-Campus Crimes and Other Emergencies](#) and [Reporting Off-Campus Crimes and Other Emergencies](#), UAPD encourages anyone with knowledge of a crime on or off campus to report it. In order to maximize safety on campus and aid in prompt investigations, we ask that you report to the UA Police Department any incident that may qualify as homicide (murder, non-negligent and negligent manslaughter); sex offenses (forcible, non-forcible); robbery; aggravated assault; burglary; motor vehicle theft; arson; and any hate crime for inclusion in the Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report.

Types, Frequency, and Descriptions of Crime Prevention Programs

The University uses various mechanisms to inform students and employees about the prevention of crime. UAPD publishes the [Safer Living Guide](#), which provides information on how to report criminal activity as well as practical steps students and employees can take to prevent theft of property and more serious crimes of violence, including physical and sexual assaults. This publication emphasizes that crime and accident prevention starts with the individual, and that becoming informed about the University's safety procedures and services outlined in the guide is a good first step toward preventing crime.

Specifically, this guide:

- highlights [Operation ID](#), a UAPD service that offers engraving tools for use by the University community to mark personal property for identification purposes in case of burglary, theft or robbery;
- invites participation in the semi-annual campus outdoor lighting tours designed to ensure a well-lit campus;
- explains how to operate the approximately 110+ blue, **emergency phones**, which are directly linked to the UA Police Department and located throughout campus (see [campus map](#));
- sets forth practical and easy-to-implement safety tips for on-the-road traveling, visits to public places, and residential living;
- lists several safety precautions to prevent acquaintance rape and drug-induced sexual assaults, and the more frequent theft-related crimes;
- discusses the **Victim Assistance Program**, which was developed to assist victims of crimes that occur on campus in the areas of criminal prosecution, victim's rights, and victim assistance;
- provides tips on how to recognize safe, off-campus apartments through our [Crimson Choice](#) program;

- gives advice on how to comply with local and state laws by abiding by traffic, parking, and public nuisance laws and/or city ordinances;
- provides information on how to handle medical and safety emergencies; and how to implement **Emergency Preparedness** guidelines in your lifestyle.

The Safer Living Guide is widely distributed to the campus community and can be accessed online at <http://www.police.ua.edu/slg.html>.

The UAPD also offers a variety of crime prevention/safety education programs to UA students and employees. These programs include but are not limited to the following:

- **Safe@UA Program:** The University encourages every member of the first year class to complete **Safe@UA**, an on-line, interactive guide to increasing your safety skills and habits. It is a video and assessment created by UA students, staff, and officers to compliment the printed, Safer Living Guide. Safe@UA is designed to heighten awareness of crimes that may occur and provide campus members with the knowledge needed to minimize their risk of becoming a victim.
- **Crimson Watch Program:** This program is a unified effort between the SGA, University Police, Tuscaloosa Police, and members of the communities in the perimeter or fringe areas surrounding the UA campus. **The Crimson Watch program** is similar to a Neighborhood Watch program with its primary focus being to assist in teaching safety to the members of this community and help them learn how to protect themselves and their neighborhoods in order to reduce crime.
- **Safety Presentations:** Addresses all issues of personal safety, including alcohol/drug abuse awareness, prevention of sexual assaults and property crimes, travel safety tips, state/local laws, etc. **Safety presentations**, accompanied by brochures and other printed materials, are made to the following groups:
 - **Parents of New Students**
 - **New Student Orientation**
 - **Residence Hall Students**
 - **Other Campus Groups or Organizations** - *such as UA employees, nursing students, students with disabilities, international students, student government, specific campus organizations and intercollegiate athletes*
- **Printed Crime Prevention Materials:** Printed crime prevention materials such as the **Safer Living Guide** are related to personal safety, bicycle safety, residence hall safety, and theft prevention and are widely distributed at safety presentations and at various on-campus locations.
- **Crime Prevention Publicity:** Crime prevention articles and related materials are periodically published in the student newspaper, **The Crimson White**.
- **Rape Awareness, Education, and Prevention:** The University of Alabama **Women's Resource Center** and the **Community Oriented Police** program provide

rape awareness, education, and prevention presentations to the University community throughout the year.

- **Crime Stoppers:** The University Police Department participates in the local Crime Stoppers program wherein callers may anonymously give information concerning crimes and receive monetary rewards for their help.
- **Community Oriented Policing Program (COP):** Upon request by University divisions, departments, and organizations, University Police officers attend meetings to provide up-to-date crime prevention information, and to hear the concerns of University community members about crime and safety issues. These officers also offer safety programming to their respective campus communities.
- **UAPD Web Site:** The UAPD maintains a Web site at <http://www.police.ua.edu> for quick and up-to-date information on police, fire safety, and emergency procedures. The University community is encouraged to take a few minutes to browse this site. If you have any questions, call the University Police Department at 205-348-5454.
- **Community Awareness Programs:** Members of the University Police Department are active participants in University and community sponsored awareness programs, such as The Student Health Center and UA Medical Center health fairs. One purpose of these programs is to inform the University community about the many resources available to them through various University departments on campus.

Summary of the UA Drug-Free Campus and Work Place Policy

The University of Alabama maintains that all members of its community have the right to pursue their individual and collective goals in a healthy educational environment, one that is free of the effects of alcohol and drug abuse. To help maintain such an environment, the University abides by all laws governing alcohol and other controlled substances, and provides educational and rehabilitative counseling to its students, staff, and faculty. The President of the University of Alabama has issued a zero tolerance policy statement to the University student community, which is as follows: "The University of Alabama has a zero tolerance policy on the sale, distribution or use of drugs, on and off campus. Our zero tolerance policy means that a University of Alabama student involved with the trafficking, sale, distribution or use of drugs on, or off campus will, for the safety and well-being of our student body, be subject to immediate suspension pending completion of a disciplinary review, with permanent expulsion as the potential ultimate penalty".

All members of the University community have the right to pursue their individual and collective goals in a healthy work and educational environment, one that is free of the effects of alcohol and substance abuse. Such abuse adversely affects the University's achievement of its mission and is not condoned. Responsibility for problems of substance

abuse resides with each member of the University community. The University's principal approach to issues of alcohol and substance abuse entails a wide range of education, prevention, and assistance activities conducted within its academic curricula; educational programs to inform individuals of the effects and consequence of using alcohol or other substances, and comprehensive counseling programs for faculty, staff, and students. The University recognizes that alcohol and substance abuse are illnesses that are not resolved easily by personal effort but may require professional assistance and treatment. Faculty, staff, and students are encouraged to take advantage of the preventive, diagnostic, referral, and counseling services available through the University.

All members of the University community have a personal responsibility to adhere to all applicable laws, policies, and regulations concerning the use of alcohol or other drugs. These include federal and state laws, city ordinances, the **Code of Student Conduct**, the faculty standards of conduct, regulations governing conduct of classified employees, and other University policy statements. The Drug-Free Campus and Work Place Policy applies to all members of the University community, including all full-time and part-time students, all full-time and part-time permanent and temporary employees, including faculty, administration, and all exempt and non-exempt staff, and all student employees and interns.

It applies to behavior that occurs on the University campus, on property owned or controlled by the University, or at University-sponsored or University-supervised activities. Each vice president has been delegated the responsibility for coordinating University drug abuse education, prevention, and intervention activities serving individuals employed or functioning in their division. The University of Alabama continues its commitment to cooperate with the local school systems and area colleges, as well as other local, state, regional, and federal agencies, in addressing problems of substance abuse in the university community.

The University reviews its drug abuse prevention programs to determine their effectiveness, to implement any needed changes, and to ensure that disciplinary sanctions are consistently enforced.

Descriptions of Drug-Abuse and/or Substance Education Programs

University Police Programming

Safety Presentations made by UAPD representatives address all issues of personal safety, including but not limited to:

- **Alcohol Awareness** - information on the physical/mental effects of alcohol; **driving under the influence** (DUI) and its possible consequences; **binge drinking** and its possible consequences.

- **Date Rape Drugs** - drug names and effects; informing victims on the ways drugs can be administered without the victim's knowledge.
- **Party Smart** - addresses safety issues related to parties.

To assist the campus community in understanding the laws regarding alcohol and drug offenses, the **Safer Living Guide** educates students and employees about the penalties and risks associated with: a) driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol; b) public intoxication; c) violation of the city's open beverage container ordinance; d) violation of the laws prohibiting a minor from being in possession of alcohol and prohibiting the sale of alcohol to a minor; and e) violation of the law prohibiting adults to allow minors to consume or possess alcohol at an open house party. In addition to reviewing penalties under the law, the Safer Living Guide warns students that a violation of drug or alcohol laws, in addition to violations of any federal or state law, may subject the student to the disciplinary processes associated with a violation of the University of Alabama Code of Student Conduct. Students are advised that they may be asked to appear before a University of Alabama judicial body and explain their misconduct, even if it did not occur on campus. Sanctions could include a warning, probation, loss of privileges, fines, discretionary sanctions, participation in alcohol and other drug education workshops, community service, random drug screens, residential housing suspension or expulsion, or University suspension or expulsion.

Health Promotion and Wellness Programs

The **Health Promotion and Wellness** (HPW) Department is the outreach arm for the Student Health Center which is managed by the College of Community Health Sciences (CCHS). As part of its mission to address student health and wellbeing, the HPW Department initiated a campus wide strategic planning process in 2005. From this initiative, seven strategic teams were formed including faculty and staff from across the divisions of the university to deliberate and make recommendations regarding population based education and intervention as a means of supporting student health and academic success. The Strategic Health Team for Alcohol and Other Drugs (AOD) has been particularly active. The foundation education program, AlcoholEdu which is evidenced based and used by over 500 colleges and universities, was purchased and implemented in 2006 as a required program for all entering freshmen. Parents are also informed of the program at Orientation and invited to take the course and begin dialog with their students prior to coming to UA. Because of extensive collaborative efforts across campus, the average completion rate for AlcoholEdu for freshmen is between 96-97% over the past 5 years (2006-2010). During 2007-2010, there were 19,566 students who received a baseline of knowledge and decision-making strategies around alcohol use which translates into 48,915 hours of prevention education. While the freshmen class is the primary target for this program, we make the program also available to upper classmen. In addition, AlcoholEdu for Sanctions is a program made available to Judicial Affairs in the Dean of Students Office, the Athletics Department or on an individual request basis for those who have had alcohol violations.

Curriculum infusion is yet another way HPW provides prevention education to students. One signature program initiated in 2006 is our 3 hour course, Health and Wellness Advocacy (CHS200) which provides education on college health concerns, preparation and national certification as a Peer Educator (CPE), and interactive learning on health advocacy. Beginning with an initial class of 13 this course has grown to 30. These students are a rich source of members of our Project Health Peer Education Program described below. In addition, E-Learning modules on personal health (“Bama Body Shop”) and mental wellness (“Bama Mind and Body”) have been introduced into freshmen Compass Classes.

Throughout the academic year and particularly at stressful times, Health Educators are involved in awareness weeks, safety education campaigns through varied print/video/ simulation exercises/ and presentations to student organizations and more. Examples of population-based educational materials produced include BAC brochures, alcohol poisoning cards with emergency numbers on the reverse side, safety message magnets, Facebook safety ads, etc. Annually, we and campus partners bring the Save-A-Life Tour to campus. This nationally acclaimed program features a 3 dimensional simulation of driving under the influence of alcohol which is so realistic that those standing around the student driver also get the sensation of what it feels like to be riding in a car with a drunk driver. With the assistance of our PharmD faculty in CCHS, the HPW Department has produced 22 drug fact sheets and distributed to departments across campus for posting; these drug sheets provide information about the most commonly abused prescription and recreational drugs among college students. Group presentations regarding these drugs are also provided to student organizations on request to RAs (Resident Hall Assistants). These are prominently posted in several high traffic areas on campus. Web access to these materials is provided through various departments as well.

The student leadership involvement is promoted through an active and new program called Project Health, our peer education program. Beginning in 2006, this group has grown from a handful of students to approximately 70. A formal structure and official student organization status led this group to two recognition awards in its second year. These students are trained in advocacy in the areas of health concerns most common to college students. They assist with the planning and execution of projects and events throughout the year. They are led by a professional Health Educator staff member of the HPW Department.

Partnerships are forged to build strong communication links throughout the campus and to bridge the major campus divisions (Student Affairs, Academic Affairs, and Financial Affairs) and student organizations for relevant and meaningful education, deliberation and engagement activities on the subject of alcohol and other drugs as well as other health topics. Partnerships with HPW include the UAPD, Counseling Center, Women’s Resource Center, Dean of Students, Judicial Affairs, Housing and Residential Communities, Financial Aid, University Rec Center, Ferguson Center, Campus Activities, Student Government Association (SGA), Community Service Center, Campus Based Ministry Association as well

as the seven **Strategic Health Teams** (AOD, Mental Health, Tobacco Ed, Nutrition, Eating Disorders, Healthy Relationships, and Financial Health).

Alcohol and other drugs are commonly associated with mental health concerns. In 2008, UA purchased yet another population-based education program, MentalHealthEdu. This program is directed at faculty, staff and student employees and designed to provide basic education about the signs of distress and to promote opportunities for early intervention for the safety and wellbeing of students. As an outgrowth of this program, through our Mental Health Strategic Team we have instituted a Mental Health Liaison for each academic college on campus to further promote the MentalHealthEdu program as well as provide additional support for faculty, staff and student employees who may encounter students showing early signs of distress. The aim is to actively engage members of the academic community in meaningful dialog about the importance of this critical area to student health and academic success. The Counseling Center has the lead in training the Mental Health Liaisons. The Mental Health Strategic Team provides continuing support through electronic updates.

The Red Watch Band (RWB) movement is designed to end alcohol overdose deaths by teaching students how to handle alcohol emergencies and summon professional help. The Red Watch symbolizes the "band" of students who are trained to "watch" over one another when "every second counts."

The program, developed by Stony Brook University, promotes a student culture of kindness, responsibility, compassion, and respect. Specifically, the Red Watch Band program consists of a four-hour training session which teaches students how to recognize alcohol emergencies and respond effectively. All of the participants receive CPR certification and are able to understand how alcohol emergencies are medical emergencies that require immediate, professional care.

The HPW Department is committed to fostering an environment for student health and wellbeing and academic success through collaboration. The community of faculty, staff and student shares a common goal for student safety and success.

Women's Resource Center Programs

Resources on the relationship of alcohol and other drugs to victimization, specifically sexual assault, as well as many other interpersonal violence resources are available for check out and/or review in the **Francis S. Summersell Library** in the Women's Resource Center.

- ***Alcohol and Other Drug Education Workshop*** - This interactive workshop encourages students to identify ways to make more choices to avoid negative consequences of alcohol. The workshop reviews campus policy and city laws regarding alcohol usage as well as its effects on the mind and body. The goal of this workshop is to provide motivation to change drinking behaviors to include safer drinking or non-drinking habits. This interactive workshop is specifically designed for first time students who are cited for underage drinking, either in the community, on campus or in the residence halls and students who are in violation of the drug and alcohol policy at the University of Alabama.
- ***Capstone Character Ethics and Values Workshop*** - This interactive workshop reviews integrity and the components of ethical decision-making. The goals of the workshop is to allow students to reflect on their specific situation that brought them to the workshop, to explore personal ethical decision-making, to help students develop moral attitudes and behavior to care for and respect the rights of others, and to encourage students to assume personal responsibility for their decisions. Judicial Affairs staff collaborates with the campus Career Center staff. The Career Center addresses how the decisions students make today, will affect their future and how having violations on their student or permanent record could decrease their chances of getting a good job. In addition they discuss a career action plan and also give advice as to what qualities future employers look for in an employee. The Capstone Character workshop is designed to provide an educational opportunity for students who violate the damage/destruction, theft, first time possession of narcotics or controlled substances, failure to comply with a disciplinary decision, first time and failure to observe policies that may or may not include alcohol charges.
- ***Student Success Workshop*** – This workshop is a collaboration with The Office of Health Promotion and Wellness. The workshop is designed according to the evidenced based program BASICS, which utilizes behavioral motivational interviewing. The workshop facilitated by a licensed Clinical Social Worker working within the Health Promotion and Wellness Office consists of two sessions- assessments and feedback. Each session is two hours in length. This program is specifically designed for first time violations of the student code of conduct related to narcotics and controlled substances.
- ***Judicial Affairs First Year Student Class Presentation*** - This interactive program discusses the judicial process and mission of the Office of Student Judicial Affairs. The goal of this presentation is to educate first year students about community expectations at the University of Alabama.

- **Marijuana 101** – Marijuana 101 is a fast-paced, relevant, and individualized program for each student offering a 6-lesson online course that specifically addresses marijuana use. The Marijuana 101 course also includes a 30-day follow-up so that students can measure changes in behavior.
- **Alcohol EDu for Sanctions** – Alcohol EDu for Sanctions is an online course (approximately 3 hours) designed specifically to help students in violation of the drug and alcohol policy at the University of Alabama for the second time or cannot attend the alcohol and drug education workshop due to a class schedule conflict. The course includes a 30-day follow-up so that students can measure changes in behavior.

Employee Assistance Program (EAP)

The **University of Alabama's EAP** is an employee assistance program designed to provide employees and their family members with resources for resolving work-related and personal problems, including substance abuse. This program provides free assessment, short-term counseling, and referral services. EAP members are also available to University departments to conduct programs on drug-free workplace.

Prevention and Reporting of Sexual Assaults

A. Commitment

The University of Alabama is committed to maintaining a supportive and safe educational environment, one which seeks to enhance the well-being of all members of its community. This commitment reflects the institution's adherence to its mission, to its various policies supporting its mission, and to relevant state and federal laws. To that end, the University has adopted the following sexual assault policy and procedures.

The University of Alabama **Women's Resource Center** and the **Community Oriented Police** provide rape awareness, education, and prevention programs to the University community throughout the year.

B. Definitions

Sexual assault is defined, for purposes of this policy, as *any form of attempted or actual nonconsensual sexual contact by a member of the University community, whether such person is known or unknown to the victim, against another member of the University community.*

A person shall be deemed not to have knowingly and/or voluntarily consented within the meaning of this policy if, at the time of the attempt or of the sexual assault, the person is

incapable of giving consent because of mental incapacitation, physical impairment, alcohol or drug consumption, or loss of consciousness.

For the purposes of this policy, **sexual contact** shall mean *any touching of the sexual or other intimate parts of a person, done for the purpose of gratifying the sexual desire of either party.*

C. Reporting Procedures

The University strongly encourages individuals to report sexual assaults to the appropriate law enforcement agencies and University officials. Reporting an assault is the only effective way that action can be taken against the alleged attacker.

Victims are encouraged to use the following procedures:

- **Report to the Police:** Individuals are strongly urged to first contact the University Police (if assaulted on campus) or local police authorities (if assaulted off campus). All agencies may be reached by calling 911. UA police officers can assist in notifying local police authorities.
- **Report to Other UA Officials:** Individuals may also contact the following University administrative offices for assistance:
 - Women's Resource Center, 205-348-5040. After hours, a victim's advocate may be reached by calling UA Police, 205-348-5454, and requesting that an advocate be notified.
 - UA Counseling Services, 205-348-3863
 - UA Student Judicial Affairs, 205-348-8234
- **Voluntary, Confidential Reporting of Sexual Offenses:** Although victims of sexual offenses are not required to report offenses to the police, reporting is strongly encouraged. If an individual is entirely certain that they will not take legal action, they are encouraged to contact the Women's Resource Center, 205-348-5040, which can confidentially receive information for inclusion in the crime statistics and can provide free, confidential counseling to the victim.

Local news media may receive notice of sexual assaults reported to the University Police Department so that others are alerted; names of victims are not released; privacy is protected at all times. No pressure is placed on a sexual assault victim to report the attack if they choose not to report; victim's parents **will not** be notified without the victim's consent.

D. Medical and Counseling Support Services

It is very important for victims of sexual assault to obtain immediate medical care following a sexual assault. Whether or not the sexual assault is reported, medical care will

ensure the victim's well-being and the documentation, collection, and proper preservation of physical evidence in the assault.

Medical attention: In addition to care of obvious injuries, medical attention is needed to protect the victim from sexually transmitted diseases or the possibility of pregnancy. If you have been raped and might consider taking legal action against the rapist, you need to receive medical care at DCH Regional Medical Center, adjacent to the university campus, or at Northport Hospital-DCH. The DCH emergency room doctors are the only area physicians who give medical exams in which evidence of rape can be obtained and preserved for legal action. Without this evidence, the chances for successful prosecution are minimized. You should have the exam as soon as possible. You will need a change of clothes; the clothes worn during the assault will be kept as evidence. If you have already changed clothes, bring along any articles that may have blood or semen on them. In order to preserve physical evidence of the assault, victims should not change clothes, bathe, douche, or use the bathroom before seeking medical care.

Forensic examinations are available free of charge to sexual assault victims at the DCH Regional Medical Center. Anyone in need of transportation to the student health center, DCH Regional Medical Center, or Northport Hospital-DCH, should contact the UA Police Department at 205-348-5454.

Confidential counseling: Student victims of sexual assault or interpersonal violence can seek confidential counseling services through the UA **Women's Resource Center**, 205-348-5040, or the **Counseling Center**, 205-348-3863; both offices are located in the South Lawn Office Building on Jackson Avenue on the University of Alabama Campus.

a) The Women's Resource Center offers a Sexual Assault Victim Advocacy Program for victims of dating/domestic violence, stalking, and sexual assault. The program provides confidential counseling and advocacy for victims, including individual and group counseling, accompaniment to a hospital immediately after an assault, information and referral for campus or community resources, and general assistance to victims, their families, and friends by providing information and support. If requested by the victim and if reasonably available, the University will provide modifications to living arrangements for the victim, if residing in University housing. Also, if requested by the victim and if reasonably available, rearrangement of academic class schedules for the victim may be provided. The Women's Resource Center Sexual Assault Victim Advocate can be contacted at 205-348-5040 or by calling University Police, 205-348-5454, after regular business hours.

b) **Programs and services provided by the Women's Resource Center** and funded by the Victims of Crime Act, are dedicated to decreasing incidents of violence against women, including dating/domestic violence, stalking, rape, and other forms of sexual assault. Individual and group counseling services are provided through the Women's Resource Center for victims of interpersonal violence (including dating violence, domestic violence,

stalking, and childhood physical violence) and for victims of sexual assault (including attempted rape, rape, childhood sexual assault, and sexual harassment). Persons eligible for these services include students, faculty and staff of the University of Alabama. All services are free and confidential. A support group called VOICES is offered for survivors of sexual assault, childhood sexual abuse, and other forms of interpersonal violence.

c) The On-Call Dean Program was developed to provide students and their families with support and assistance in times of trauma and distress. The On-Call Dean initiates professional and personal support for students in crisis by working with other University offices such as University Police, Media Relations, and the various colleges and schools within the University. In addition, the On-Call Dean interacts with community agencies such as local hospitals and the Tuscaloosa Police Department. This program is a visible illustration of the Division of Student Affairs and The University of Alabama's commitment to providing a nurturing environment for all students. This program enhances our efforts to maintain a warm and caring community.

Other resources: Off-campus counseling, mental health services and a variety of other services are provided by **Turning Point** Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault Services, 205-758-0808.

E. Women's Resource Center Sexual Assault Victim Advocate

The University of Alabama Women's Resource Center provides a Victim Advocate Program. This program provides needed support in a time of crisis to victims of sexual assault and interpersonal violence. The advocate will help victims, their families and friends by providing information and support. Modifications to living arrangements for the victim and the accused, if residing in on-campus housing, may be provided if requested and if reasonably available. Also, rearrangement of academic class schedules for the victim and the accused may be provided if requested and if reasonably available. The Victim Advocate can also assist the victim in dealing with academic difficulties which may arise because of the victimization and its impact. Notifying professors of class absences, obtaining missed assignments, and arranging for tutoring and assistance may be provided upon request and if reasonably available.

F. Procedures Followed After A Report Of A Sexual Offense Is Made To University Police

When a sexual assault is investigated, the victim may be unprepared for the lengthy, public process of bringing the perpetrator to justice. UA Police and other involved officers respect the victim's feelings but must also observe due process of law. The following outline of a sexual assault investigation can help victims of sexual offenses understand the process of the investigation.

Immediate Response to Report: After an assault has occurred and the victim contacts campus or city police, patrol officers will respond to the victim, ensure her well-being, and summon a Victim's Advocate from the Women's Resource Center or the District Attorney's Victim Services office. The advocate will assist the victim throughout the investigation. The officers will help the victim arrange medical care at the emergency room where a doctor will counsel the victim, treat injuries and potential sexually transmitted diseases, and preserve physical evidence of the assault. The victim advocate can accompany the victim to the hospital and is available to give advice about additional counseling and support services if necessary.

Step One. The responding patrol officers, after receiving a brief description of what happened from the victim, will inform the appropriate police units and investigators. Officers will secure the crime scene and interview any witnesses. Responding investigators will arrive to identify and preserve evidence at the crime scene and conduct additional interviews if necessary.

Step Two. When ready, the victim must provide a detailed statement of the assault to the investigators. The victim advocate or a Victim Services officer may be present.

Step Three. Officers may ask the victim to try and identify the suspect from a photo or physical lineup.

Step Four. Investigators must gather enough evidence to establish "probable cause," i.e., legal reason to arrest the suspect. When the evidence is ready, the investigators and victim will appear to meet with a magistrate to ask for a warrant allowing the suspect's arrest. If a warrant is granted, the suspect can be arrested and jailed. The suspect may not spend all of the time before the trial in custody; bail/bond can be provided for the defendant.

Step Five. There may be several judicial proceedings before the actual trial. For instance, a 'preliminary hearing' may be held. This hearing, which is conducted before a judge, may require the victim to answer questions from the prosecuting attorneys and the defendant's attorney. The victim may also be asked to appear before the Grand Jury when it convenes to determine if the defendant is to be indicted. If the Grand Jury issues a 'True Bill', a trial will be scheduled.

Step Six. The trial will typically be held in the Tuscaloosa County Courthouse in downtown Tuscaloosa. Sexual assault trials generally involve testimony from the victim, the police investigators, the emergency-room personnel, and other witnesses. If the accused defendant is found to be guilty of the crime, the judge will set the term of punishment.

G. University Code of Student Conduct and Disciplinary Process

The Office of Judicial Affairs will investigate and assess sanctions if a student or student organization is found to be in violation of the **Code of Student Conduct**. Any member of the University community may file charges against any student for alleged misconduct.

Violations of the Code of Student Conduct include charges relating to sexual misconduct. Charges must be prepared in writing and directed to the judicial investigator in the Office of Judicial Affairs. Any charge should be submitted as soon as possible after the event takes place, preferably within one month of knowledge of the occurrence. For more information, contact the Office of Judicial Affairs at 205-348-8234.

Sanctions up to and including expulsion from residence halls and suspension or expulsion from the University may be imposed if, through the investigation and hearing process, the accused is found to be responsible. The University of Alabama is committed to providing an investigative hearing process that is sensitive, fair, supportive, and respectful of the rights and needs of all involved. To the extent not already provided for by existing disciplinary procedures, the complainant and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a disciplinary proceeding; both the complainant and the accused shall be informed of the outcome of any institutional disciplinary proceeding brought alleging a sex offense. As provided by existing University disciplinary procedures, under appropriate circumstances, interim measures may be taken to provide for the safety of the complainant, of the accused and of witnesses. University disciplinary procedures and possible sanctions are described in the **Code of Student Conduct**.

H. Educational Programs

The University of Alabama is committed to providing preventive, informative, and supportive programs for all members of the University community. Campus-wide programs coordinated by the **Women's Resource Center** are designed to increase safety awareness, develop self defense techniques, improve communication skills between women and men, help prevent acquaintance and stranger rape and drug-induced sexual assaults, alcohol and other drugs and violence information, build self-esteem, and provide information on steps to take in the event of a sexual assault. Some of the more noted educational programs offered by the Women's Resource Center include:

- **Unscripted Peer Theater Group:** Unscripted is an educational theater troupe which trains a diverse group of students on social justice issues and interpersonal violence. Students apply their knowledge of these topics to interactive and contemporary scenarios which they perform for the University of Alabama classes and organizations. The scenarios generate dialogue amongst college students regarding different types of oppressive issues helping to build awareness and activism in our community.

- **Violence Against Women/Speakers Bureau:** The Women's Resource Center staff is available to serve as speakers to present programs on a wide variety of issues of concern to women including violence against women, risk management, healthy relationships, and leadership. Presentations can take place on or off of campus for classes, organizations, clubs, and other groups. Presentations can be adapted to the specific needs of your organization.
- **Harbor:** The purpose of Harbor is to create safe places throughout campus where victims of interpersonal violence can go to receive assistance. Through the training, faculty and staff gain insight and sensitivity to the issues of dating/domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Harbor trainings last about two hours and can be incorporated into a single staff meeting or broken into components to accommodate participant schedules.
- **Violence against Women on Campus: Guide for Faculty and Staff:** This guide was designed especially for faculty and staff who work with students at the University. It defines sexual assault and dating violence, as well as the role of alcohol and other drugs, warning signs, and what to do if you know someone who has been raped or is in a violent relationship. This guide is distributed to all new faculty and professional staff. Please contact the Women's Resource Center, 205-348-5040, if you would like a copy or need extra copies.

Crime Statistics

Caveats:

- **On-Campus Residential** statistics are a subset of the **On-Campus** statistics;
- Certain Crime Statistics may include information reported to University authorities other than police and where the subject chose not to make a police report;
- The statistics for the crime of Robbery may include multiple-victim reports;
- The statistics for Burglary were amended by The University of Alabama in January 2007 to include thefts from a structure when lawful entry could not be proven. The adjusted total includes incidents of theft (the unlawful taking of property) where forcible entry was not used and it could not be determined if the offender was trespassing (entered or remained unlawfully).
- The statistics for the crime of Burglary were amended by The University of Alabama in September of 2010 to reflect three conditions that must be present: evidence of unlawful entry, either forced or unforced; the unlawful entry must occur within a structure defined as having four walls, a roof and a door; and the entry into the structure must show evidence that the entry was made in order to commit a felony or theft. If the intent was not to commit a felony or theft, or if the intent cannot be determined, the proper classification is Theft/Larceny.
- The Hate Crimes reporting requirement was amended in the 2010 report to include the crimes of Larceny/Theft, Intimidation, Simple Assault, and Damage/Destruction/Vandalism of property.
- **Public Property** includes all public property, (including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities) that are within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.
- **Non-Campus** includes university locations not reasonably contiguous to the main UA Campus. These areas include: University of Alabama Arboretum and Golf Course property, Moundville Archaeological Park and Brewer Porch Children's Center.

A Report of the Three Most Recent Years' Fire Statistics in On-Campus Student Housing Facilities

In accordance with the federal regulations of the Campus Fire Safety Right-to-Know Act and the Department of Education regulations, the University of Alabama publishes *both* fire statistics for the three most recent calendar years *and* UA fire-related policies and procedures. This information is distributed each year to enrolled students and current employees and is also made available to prospective employees and students. The first report with the required three years of most recent fires in on-campus student housing facilities will be provided in 2012. The fire statistics published in this report by facility name illustrate the reporting of fires in on-campus student housing facilities. Each fire listed provides the nature of the fire, number of injuries related to a fire that resulted in treatment at a medical facility, the number of deaths related to a fire and the value of property damage caused by the fire. See the [Fire Statistics](#) for the statistics related to fires in on-campus student housing facilities and the Fire Log for more details related to each individual fire. The Fire Log includes information like the date the fire was reported, the time of the fire and a brief explanation of each fire.

Also, in compliance with the above regulations, a description of each on-campus student housing facility's fire safety system is included in this document along with the number of regular mandated supervised fire drills that occur yearly at each facility in the [Fire Safety System Description](#). Procedures for evacuation and policies regarding certain practices (e.g., smoking, candles, and open flames) are included along with potential plans for improvements in fire safety. A Guide to University of Alabama Security and Fire Safety Procedures and Policies

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Reporting On-Campus Fires and Other Emergencies

To maximize safety on campus, the University Department of Public Safety strongly encourages anyone with knowledge about any fire or unsafe action or condition on-campus to immediately report to the University Police by telephone or in person. Reporting fires and unsafe actions or conditions help University officials keep the community informed about fires on-campus and address the unsafe actions or conditions.

To make a report by telephone, call The University of Alabama Police Department (UAPD) at 205-348-5454 and describe the situation to the Police Communications Operator. In emergency situations, including fires, call UAPD at 205-348-5454 or 911 once you have evacuated the location. All 911 calls made from campus phones go directly to the UA Police Department; all cell phone 911 calls are routed to UAPD through a local 911 center.

UA students requiring non-emergency medical care may contact the Student Health Center at 205-348-6262. Students seeking counseling services may contact the Counseling Center at 205-348-3863, the Psychology Clinic at 205-348-5000, or the Women's Resource Center at 205-348-5040. UA employees requiring non-emergency medical care may contact the University Medical Center at 205-348-1770 or DCH Regional Medical Center at 205-759-7111 for non-emergency medical care and for counseling. UA students and employees requiring emergency medical care should contact UAPD at 205-348-5454 or 911.

UA Response to On-Campus Fires

When you report a fire emergency to the UA Police Department, the Tuscaloosa Fire Department will be dispatched, as well as other Public Safety representatives from the UA Police Department and/or Environmental Health & Safety. The Public Safety representatives will meet with you, listen to what happened and if necessary make a preliminary report. A Public Safety representative will review the report and conduct a follow-up interview if necessary. During cases of arson, investigators will review the scene and conduct a follow-up investigation. If occupants or residents must be relocated following a fire, information regarding the relocation or the emergency at hand will be provided through Housing and Residential Communities and the University of Alabama Department of Media Relations.

The University of Alabama Department of Public Safety encourages you to report fires on-campus. The Department of Public Safety is responsible for preparing the University's Annual Campus Security and Fire Safety Report and for compiling the fire statistics included in the report. We would like to keep the community as informed as possible. The information you report may require the UAPD to issue a Crime Alert in the case of Arson or a UAPD Advisory if they determine that the circumstances warrant such action. Student Organization Facilities: The University of Alabama operates no off-campus student organization facilities. All student organizations recognized by The University of Alabama are headquartered on campus and are therefore served by the UA Police Department. If you believe a fire has occurred within an on-campus student organization building, report the incident to the UA Police Department at 205-348-5454.

Fringe Areas of Campus: While the City of Tuscaloosa has primary jurisdiction and responsibility in all areas off-campus, UA Police can and do respond to most incidents that occur in close proximity to campus which includes fires and arson. To report an off-campus fire contact 911 in an emergency situation or Tuscaloosa Fire & Rescue Service at 205-248-5420.

Fire Logs & Summary of Fire Incidents

The University of Alabama Department of Public Safety compiles statistical information from the contents of the UAPD daily logs and The Tuscaloosa Fire Department run reports to on-campus locations, both of which contain summaries of fire emergencies. The fire log includes each fire that occurred in an on-campus student housing facility by the date that it was reported to either UAPD or Tuscaloosa Fire Department. Each entry provides the date of the fire, time of the fire, general location of the fire, nature of the fire, number of fire-related injuries that resulted in treatment at a medical facility, number of deaths related to a fire, the value of property damage caused by the fire and a brief description of the fire. The Fire Logs are available for public viewing, 24 hours a day, at the Police Department and during normal working hours at Environmental Health & Safety. Submission of UA Fire Statistics to Additional Agencies

In October 2010, the University of Alabama Department of Public Safety began submitting fire statistics annually to the Department of Education. The Fire Statistics are available at <http://www.bama.ua.edu/~EHS/New%20Web/Fire%20Statistics%20Running%20Tab.xls>.

In October 2000, the University of Alabama Police began submitting crime statistics (including incidents of arson) to the Department of Education. Annually, UAPD contributes crime statistics to the Uniform Crime Report published by the Federal Bureau of Investigation by submitting data to the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center. This detailed statistical report is available each year at academic and public libraries.

No Smoking Policy (Smoking Violations)

Smoking is prohibited in all buildings on campus. This policy was established on November 21, 1991 at the recommendation of The University of Alabama Health and Safety Committee. "No Smoking" signs have been posted in all University Facilities. Smoking in a campus building could warrant a range of disciplinary sanctions up to and including dismissal. Code of Student Conduct (Fire Safety Violations)

The Code of Student Conduct outlines the expectations of the University of Alabama for the behavior of the student body. It describes the actions that fail to meet expectations, the process of determining when a failure has occurred and the consequences for such failure. Under the Code of Student Conduct entering false fire alarms or bomb threats, tampering with fire extinguishers, alarms or other safety equipment is described as misconduct as it disrupts order and exhibits a disregard of health & safety. Any student found to have violated the Student Code can be sanctioned with a warning, probation, loss of privileges, fines, restitution, discretionary sanctions, resident hall suspension, resident hall expulsion, university suspension or university expulsion. Community Living Standards (Fire Safety Violations)

Housing and Residential Communities (HRC) outline the responsibilities of the students living in on-campus housing facilities in the Community Living Standards. The students are expected to uphold these standards while living in campus housing as they promote a safe and secure community. This document lists violations that compromise the safety and security of residents and these violations may result in appropriate disciplinary sanctions, including up to contract termination from on-campus housing. This document states that all

residents must adhere to the fire safety guidelines, they must evacuate during a fire drill or alarm, they must not interfere with the emergency evacuation procedures of the residence hall, they must never falsely report a fire emergency by activating the fire alarm system or contacting police, fire or staff members and they must never tamper with fire safety or life safety equipment. The standard also prohibits occupants from smoking at a non-designated location in or adjacent to a residence hall. Housing Contract (Open Flame Policy Violations)

The Housing Contract is maintained by HRC and is completed by occupants prior to moving into on-campus housing. This contract prohibits occupants from using or storing items that pose a fire hazard, such as open flame sources (including, but not limited to, hookah lamps, candles, incense, etc.), flammable liquids, trees, branches, halogen lamps and bulbs, ammunition, explosives, fireworks and open coil or high heat appliances. Violations of the Housing Contract which compromise the safety and security of occupants or others, may result in relocation, contract termination, and other appropriate disciplinary sanctions. Included in these violations are tampering, alarming, discharging, disconnecting, or dismantling the fire safety equipment and starting fires in the residence halls. Housing & Residential Communities Glossary of Policies for On-Campus Housing (Portable Electrical Appliance Violations)

The Housing and Residential Communities Glossary of Policies for On-Campus Housing is a collection of policies, procedures and regulations for students living in campus housing. As part of the terms and conditions of the resident hall contract, residents agree to abide by these policies. Violations of these policies which compromise the safety and security of occupants or others may result in relocation, contract termination, and other appropriate disciplinary sanctions. The Glossary of Policies provides guidance for decorating UA housing spaces and a list of prohibited materials. Additionally, it provides a list of appliances that are prohibited in campus housing as they present unacceptable fire hazards. Appliances with an exposed heating element or exposed heating coil are not approved for use. Examples of other non-approved appliances in residence hall rooms include, but are not limited to, personal space heaters, personal air conditioners, halogen lamps, deep fat fryers, electric griddles, electric grills, electric waffle irons, electric woks, hot oil popcorn poppers, hot plates, indoor grills, indoor broilers, toaster ovens or any cooking tool that doesn't have automatic shut off. Examples of some approved portable electrical appliances include blenders, can openers and food processors. Safer Living Guide (Basic Emergency Evacuation Procedures)

The Safer Living Guide outlines basic emergency evacuation procedures for fire emergencies and general procedures for reporting fires on campus. Evacuation procedures can also be found in buildings on the Emergency Plans that are posted in the common areas and inside each apartment or bedroom. The Safer Living Guide also lists several reasons that students can be cited or arrested for while on campus. Included in this list is false or nuisance fire alarms. Fire Safety Policies, Procedures & Guidelines

The Fire Safety Policies, Procedures & Guidelines outline the policies and guidelines associated with the UA Fire Safety Program. This document includes the Open Lights and Flames (Candle) Policy. Open lights and flames are not allowed on campus without prior approval by Environmental Health & Safety as it is unlawful for any person to light, build, make or deposit ashes or embers which could cause fire in any building or on the campus grounds without this approval. It also discusses the evacuation procedures for occupants during fire emergencies and the roles of UA Police, Environmental Health & Safety officials and Tuscaloosa Fire and Rescue Service during these emergencies. Evacuations during Fire Emergencies (Student Housing Evacuation)

The University of Alabama Environmental Health & Safety provides information on evacuation during fire emergencies to all on-campus housing occupants. This information is provided in the Fire Safety Guide on the back of their apartment door or bedroom door and in a number of training sessions and publications provided throughout the year.

Basic principles of evacuation exist. If a fire is noticed, leave the hazard area. Do not risk a life by remaining in the unsafe building. If operating a heat source or flame, extinguish it before exiting the building, if possible. On the way out of the building, pull a fire alarm system pull station. It may be necessary to break the glass or raise the pull station cover in order to pull the alarm. Some common locations of pull stations are at stairwell doors and exits.

By sounding the alarm, occupants of the building are notified of a fire hazard and should evacuate the building. However, most importantly, UA Police Department, Environmental Health & Safety, and Tuscaloosa Fire and Rescue Service are notified immediately of the hazard. When the fire alarm sounds, everyone must proceed with their emergency

evacuation plan or evacuate the building immediately, even if another individual tells you that the fire alarm is being tested. Do not assume it is just a drill.

When evacuating, turn off any appliance or equipment you might be operating. Isolate your area by closing doors and windows and leave the building. Only use a portable fire extinguisher to control a small fire or assist yourself or someone else to evacuate the area. Remember, not all fire extinguishers are effective on all types of fires; so do not try to extinguish the fire unless you have been properly trained. Do not fight the fire if it is already beginning to spread beyond the location where it started, if you can't fight the fire with your back to an exit, or if the fire can block your only exit.

Walk; do not run when evacuating the building. Assist those individuals with disabilities or those unable to evacuate by telling authorities their locations within the building. To avoid smoke, stay low to the ground and cover your mouth and nose with a damp cloth, if possible, to help you breathe. Never use the elevators to evacuate. When evacuating, travel horizontally, moving away from the fire until you reach a safe distance away from the hazard or an exit or stairwell door. Then travel vertically down the stairwell until you reach an exit leading to the outside. Most stairwells are fire rated enclosures that can be used as areas of rescue assistance for those individuals needing assistance exiting the building. If you must open corridor doors, hallway doors, bedroom doors, or office doors, feel them first by using the back of your hand (never the palm). If they are cool, open them and continue to follow the emergency evacuation plan and move towards an exit or stairwell if conditions allow.

If the building is on fire and the occupant is trapped inside the building which is burning and cannot evacuate, then remain in the room. Close the door and position towels or articles of clothing (dampened if possible) around the bottom edge of the door. Call 911 and tell the dispatcher your name, where you are located and the reason you could not evacuate. The dispatcher will contact the UA Police Officers on the scene who will notify the Fire Department. If you have a window that can be opened, open the window and hang a sheet, piece of clothing or another similar object out the window and wave it so it can be seen. This open window will allow fresh air to circulate into the room. If the window cannot be opened, create a sign to display at the window indicating that you need help. If you feel as though you can no longer breathe, break the window out using a chair and get the attention of those below. Remain calm and wait for the Fire Department to assist you in evacuating the area.

Although The University of Alabama requires all occupants of a building to evacuate when the fire alarm is activated, individuals with disabilities may need assistance or special procedures to evacuate effectively. For this reason, they should inform other individuals, especially Community Directors or Residential Advisors that they may need assistance in a fire alarm during the emergency evacuation-planning phase. One tip that may prove useful during a fire alarm evacuation is to utilize the buddy system. During the first few days at a new job or at classes, discuss with others your need for a "buddy" if the fire alarm goes off.

Obtain several buddies in different locations where you may be during an alarm and discuss your evacuation plan with your buddies (especially Community Directors or Residential Advisors). Explain what type of assistance you would need during a fire alarm. Plan and practice your procedure or evacuation during a fire alarm. If possible, your buddy should assure your location, capabilities and need for assistance during a fire alarm (however, do not risk life). Your buddy should inform UA Police or the Tuscaloosa Fire and Rescue Service of your need for assistance, plan, and location during a fire alarm.

During the evacuation phase, persons utilizing wheelchairs should be taken to an area of rescue assistance (usually stairwell landings) or stay where they are located. This still requires their buddy to notify UA Police or the Fire Department of their location once they reach the assembly location outside. If the mobility-impaired individual is alone, he/she should dial 911 and inform the dispatcher of his/her location, inability to evacuate and/or area of rescue assistance where they are located. Persons with mobility impairments but without the need of a wheelchair will need to attempt to evacuate the building, allowing traffic to pass, when needed, in areas like stairwells. These individuals may decide to remain in place and contact 911 with their location if there is no sign of imminent hazard, and due to their impairment, they would not be able to evacuate the building at this time without assistance. Individuals who are visually impaired may need a buddy to assist him/her through the evacuation route. If the visually impaired individual is unable to evacuate alone, he/she should dial 911 and inform the dispatcher of his/her location, inability to evacuate and/or the area of rescue assistance where they are located.

Once occupants have successfully evacuated the building and are outside, occupants should move away from the building to a pre-designated location where a headcount should be initiated by the building representative, Residential Advisor, or another designated individual. Occupants should also notify UA Police of anyone needing assistance exiting the building. The building representative or some other supervisory personnel should notify UA Police of anyone unaccounted for during the evacuation. Occupants should remain outside and away from the building until you are given further instructions from Tuscaloosa Fire and Rescue Service, UA Police or a representative from Environmental Health & Safety.

Awareness & Training Regarding Fire Safety Education

Environmental Health & Safety offers a host of training opportunities including Fire Safety Awareness and Safe Use of Fire Extinguishers to any student, faculty, staff or administration member interested in such training. During this training, more in-depth information regarding UA policies, hazard awareness and emergency evacuation procedures is provided. To schedule training or to receive more information concerning training, contact Environmental Health & Safety at 205-348-5905.

Each semester Environmental Health & Safety educates students on the causes of fire, ways to reduce fires and the steps each person should take in the event of a fire. Fire drills are performed twice during each calendar year (once during both fall and spring semesters) at all on-campus housing facilities which have fire alarm systems. Each fall semester, Environmental Health & Safety also provides a publication to all on-campus housing residents regarding fire safety in campus housing. This document outlines the routine safety equipment inspections performed by representatives of Environmental Health & Safety, the reasons these inspections are performed, information on sprinkler systems, fire alarm systems, fires and evacuations and the importance in not tampering with fire safety equipment. Each summer the fire alarm systems are tested and inspected in all on-campus housing facilities.

For specific emergency evacuation procedures related to an individual building, review the Emergency Plans posted throughout the buildings in common hallways or the Fire Safety Guide provided on the back of each apartment or bedroom door. The Fire Safety Guide outlines specific emergency procedures for activating the fire alarm system, evacuation procedures and assembly locations outside the building. See [Fire Safety System Description](#) to review the fire safety features in each on-campus housing facility.

Future Improvements in Fire Safety

The University of Alabama is dedicated to improving fire safety and fire safety systems. Older fire alarm systems are replaced and buildings are retrofitted with sprinkler systems as renovations occur. All new housing facilities are equipped with sprinkler systems.
